Tree of the Quarter: Arnold Hawthorn (*Crataegus arnoldiana*) is a member of the rose family. While there are native Hawthorn to North Dakota, the Arnold is a cultivar. A small tree, Hawthorn will grow to 20 feet tall and 20 feet wide. Delicate white flowers



bloom in Spring, but don't be tempted to smell them, as they have a disagreeable odor close-up. Sharply serrated leaves measure 1 to 3 inches long and around an inch wide. The fruit are apple-like pomes, around a half-inch in diameter. While they can make good jellies, fresh hawthorn pomes have a mealy like texture, similar to a overripe Red Delicious apple. Hawthorn are excellent for riparian

plantings and are well-adapted to environmental stresses. Arnold Hawthorn are available through the Tree Store.

The Cass County Weed Control would like to remind producers of the Landowner Assistance Program for 2020. Owners or operators of non-crop, non-CRP acres can apply for assistance for partial reimbursement of chemical and application costs. 80% of the cost of the herbicide and \$3.50 per acre of application will be reimbursed, with a maximum single operator payment of \$1,500. Also remember to be diligent in scouting fields for the appearance of Palmer Amaranth. Contact Weed Control or NDSU Extension if you believe you have found the noxious weed.

Living Ag Classroom 2020




